From the Director's Desk



This year we have taken the theme of "The Role of Women in the decision making process" for our Dhyanavana convocation. On March $8^{\rm th}$ the International Women's day was celebrated throughout the world.

Further, Dhyanavana, International Institute of Holistic Spirituality, conducts nine months formative course to the Women Religious as most of them are preparing themselves for their final commitment concretizing the foundation of their future consecrated life and mission.

Women are the embodiments of love, life and caring for the existence and survival of every person. They nourish and sustain human life through their giftedness as women. Women are spiritually rich, active and wise; and program oriented.

But many women in India and many other societies are facing a lot of difficulties and challenges at every stage of their lives - be it at home or in the work place. In most situations women are not treated equal to men in dignity, rights and respect. There are many conventional and patriarchal society laws, practices and traditions that cause hostile situations to women. Millions of women lack access to qualitative higher education which can give them employment and independent living.

In the Church, though women remain the majority of those who attend liturgy and participate in Church activities, yet it is men who are predominant in the decision making process. The Church has been making several attempts to ensure equality through dialogue, discussion and discernment. But the Church needs to move forward from dialogue to real action.

Synodal working document "Enlarge the space of your Tent" (Is 54:2) No. 60-65 deals with the role of women in greater participation and decision making process in the Church.

The document (No.61) observes "In a Church where almost all decision makers are men, there are few spaces where women can make their voices heard. Yet they are the backbones of Church communities, both because they represent the majority of the practicing members and because they are among the most active members of the Church".

Therefore the Church needs to improve its awareness and Institutional aspect of Women's activities and enable women to participate more fully at all levels of the Church life.

Dhyanavana has given the women religious this enlightenment and tried to empower them to participate more fully in all the Church activities including decision making process.

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


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SYNODALITY AND INTER-RELIGIOUS DIALOGUE

By taking synodality into the lives of ordinary Christians, the Church has found herself in her own loving homes, in the hearts and minds of her children. Through this gesture, she is given a cordial welcome in her own home with special care. She is no more treated as the other. namely, the hierarchy to be respected in public but scrutinized and criticized in private. She now has become a party to welcome, and be welcomed, to be scrutinized and criticized, yet all this in her own bosom, namely, the common loving home. Is this to be restricted to her fold, the Catholic Church? Will the Church be content when we look at her identity only through this narrow spectrum Catholic Church? As a mother who loves all her children, especially those not so close to her, the Church identifies herself with the whole of humanity. To leave out any segment is to leave the Church that is, our own selves wounded and unhealed. No. this is not healthy and to that extent, the Church becomes lonely, sorrowful, and inconsolable.

There are billions of people for whom the Spouse of the Church Jesus Christ has suffered and has laid down His life. Many of them are left out for no fault of their own. They search for Him but do not find

Him. Many more are not even able to search and so how will they find Him? All the same, they are also the children of the Church whom she eagerly wants to embrace.

Inter-religious dialogue is a peephole through which they try to look at her to find out whether she is their true mother. Such dialogue can lead to an interaction of minds, hearts, and hands with people of other faith as regards all the values of life. We need to maintain and promote inter-religious dialogue as an important ministry of the Church. Whatever the difference of views on any matter on earth, dialogue brings the dialoguing partners closer to ach other.

Synod, on the other hand, is an ecclesial dynamism through which the Church tries to enhance the quality of her ongoing life. This can be done rom within or from without or both from within and from without. So far it has been done only and mainly from within. When it is done from without, our innate tendency is to look at it as a threat and reject it outright. But we forget that when it is done only from within, we tend to rationalize and defend our weakness, and may even canonize it besides censuring any criticism. Is it possible that a good child of the Church gets ostracized because s/he, out of

his/her love for the Church, pointed out some of her limitations? We may have a strong inclination to emphasize the holiness of the Church and become oblivious of unholy stains.

On the other hand, when the Church is left at the mercy of those who do not own her as their mother, the evil spirit can use them to employ every means to destroy her. They can become totally blind to the good service she renders and try to stop them. We see today how violently the Church and her children are desecrated. This tells us that the evaluation of the Church cannot be left only to the intent of those who do not own her as their mother. This situation leads us to the third choice, namely, to look at the Church both from within and from without. Seen from within, taking into consideration constructive criticism and evaluation by the people, we can attempt to change our ways for the better. On the other hand, if we invite the members of other faiths to share with us their sincere views about the Church, her life, and ministry, their testimonies perhaps could open our eyes to things that are hitherto fore hidden from us. This means opening the doors of synodality to the members of other faiths.

Inter-religious dialogue is a form of ministry in the Church that encourages meaningful contact and communication with people of other faiths. Taking into account the situation of Indian social life, this ministry becomes essential. The socio-religious fabric of India is multireligious and inter-religious. But the Christians in India are a micro-minority. Every other person, they meet with almost everywhere, be it in the streets or marketplaces, in buses or trains, in schools or colleges, except in churches and in their private homes, is a person of another faith. The impact of the Church on the people of other faiths and viceverse cannot be ignored. Synod which deals with the life of the faithful cannot have a realistic approach when we leave out an ocean of people with whom we are interrelated and concentrate only on the Christian minority. Such an approach will render synodality one-sided and incomplete. Inter-religious dialogue is a must and synodality also is a must, and absorbing both these approaches in the life of the Church will render the ministry of the Church more effective.

We need to think of the Church as inclusive of the whole of humanity even inclusive of the members of other faiths. Irrespective of their faith, there is a common life drive flowing in the veins of all human beings, namely, a yearning for the Beyond and for happiness. Their approaches may be different but the goal is common and tends to be convergent. Seen from this perspective it does not seem to be necessary to think of the

Church as exclusive of other faiths. This, however, need not mean that the Church is syncretistic. Of course, faith in Jesus Christ is essential for the Church. But that faith need not imply a clear knowledge of Jesus Christ. What, if, for no fault of their own, some have not and could not, come to the knowledge of Christ, yet have that yearning for the Beyond? Can we not call them at least a potential Church?

The Lord Himself has said, "I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So, there will be one flock, one shepherd" (Jn. 10, 16). In the light of this saying, we can definitely look at the people of other faiths as a potential Church. This demands that synodality must take into account the whole of humanity at different levels. The Church which was originally known as the 'New way' and later on called as Christianity was founded for humanity. In spite of more than two millennia have gone by after founding, the vast majority does not seem to recognize it. It could be because those who do not belong to the visible Church are a priori convinced that what they see, namely the visible Church, cannot satiate their hunger and quench their thirst for the Beyond.

There could be some truth if those who belong to other faiths see that the visible Church cannot satisfy them. Who is to be held responsible for this situation? Definitely not Our Lord Jesus Christ, the Founder nor perhaps those who belong to other faiths. It is only those who belong to the Christian faith. It is less likely that these see this problem from within the Church. There could be also other reasons that prompt the people of other faiths to see the Church as not satisfying their needs. Such reasons can be political, economic, and social. In order to understand this, we need to look at the Church not only from within but also from without. We can be so involved in the life of the Church that it makes us difficult to see her limitations from within. The weakness of the Church can be seen better from without, namely from other faiths.

Mr. Gandhi is often quoted to have remarked, 'I like Christ but not Christianity'. No doubt Christianity is not as holy and perfect as Jesus Christ. Mr. Gandhi perhaps could see what exactly fell short of in Christianity. The people of other faiths do not have any problem with Jesus Christ but they do seem to have problems with Christians and Christianity. The Church that wants to bring about self-transformation has to find out why there have been problems with Christianity and the Church. When the people of other faiths are in some way involved in synodality we may be enabled to introspect better, which in turn can lead us to a better life. Opposition and criticism have their own place in the process of progress and growth. If there were no resistance from the air in the sky, no bird would be able to fly, similarly if there were no resistance on the road no vehicle would be able to move. We are not to be threatened by the criticism of anybody. Instead, we are to welcome it and in light of it change our ways, as our elders have done in the past.

Besides, the greater the number of people involved in this synodal transformative process, the greater the success. It is, therefore, necessary that synodality must in some way involve not only the Catholics and the Christians but also the people of other faiths. Inter-religious dialogue gives us a better scope of success in synodality. To start with, witness value is very important for the Church - both for her life and ministry. Often witness seems to be contrary to her profession. How the witness falls short of what she preaches is seen better from the outside than from within. Those from within may be so accustomed to their way of functioning that they may not be able to see its inherent inconsistencies. Moreover, there is always a factor of self-defense that may prevent them from seeing these inconsistencies. While those from outside, without such attachment to these ways of functioning and without the obsession to set a good example, may be able to see better. This should make way to listen to the members of other faiths in the spirit of synodality. There are many other issues common to the followers of all faiths. They are for example, preserving and promoting a good environment, different kinds of civil service, education, and health apostolate, to mention a few. Though these are not directly connected with the life of the Church, nonetheless, they have an indirect bearing on it.

Getting people of other faiths involved in synodality can bring them closer to the Church. There should be no fear that non-Christian ways of morality and faith will gradually creep into the Church because synodality does not have the power to take the decision, especially at local levels on faith and morality. However, they can throw some light as to how we can live and practice our moral life and the life of faith which would be helpful to them as well. The same could be said of some disciplinary practices in the Church. Good and right things can be accepted irrespective of wherever they may come from as St. Paul teaches, "Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" (Phil. 4,8).

Sometimes when we face some inconveniences due to the practices of other faiths, we become very vocal. We complain about them, become very vocal about them, and criticize them. But when similar practices are seen in the Christian life, we do not even take note of them, but others are made to bear with them. When we invite people of other faiths to inter-religious dialogue and synodality and listen to them, we can see how what we condemn in others is sanctimoniously practiced by us. Noise pollution is an apt example, which we face almost every day of our life. When others use loudspeakers in their religious practice, we criticize them but when we practice it, we defend ourselves by calling it the worship of the Lord. There are a number of things in the Christian life that may not be healthy and which may be causing much inconvenience to others. These things may be brought to our notice when people of other faiths get involved in synodality.

We may argue if synodality belongs to the life of the Church how those who do not belong to the Church can be a part of it. True, in taking decisions they may not be but they do help us to arrive at more humane decisions. Nobody can deny that people of other faiths have the potential to become members of the Catholic faith. From this standpoint, they can share what invites them to the Catholic life and what exactly prevents them from becoming fully active members of the Catholic faith. A family belonging to another faith came to the realization that they must become Christians. Since there are many denominations in Christianity, they did not know in which denomination they were to seek the Christian faith. They wanted to become Catholics but they felt that life in the Catholic Church was too formal and ritualistic, devotional and less biblical. This prevented them from becoming Catholics. Instead, they sought admission to some other Christian denomination.

In conclusion, we can say that by promoting interreligious dialogue and through opening the doors of synodality to the members of other faiths, we stand to gain in our efforts to make a better Church. When what they suggest is not in tune with Catholic orthodoxy, we always have the freedom to decline. But if we close our doors to all people of other faiths because they are not Catholics, we face the risk of losing the good they are likely to suggest.

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THE DYNAMICS OF SYNODALITY IN SHEPHERDING THE CHURCH AS A FAMILY

The great temptation the Church goers often entertain is to mistakenly imagine the church as a mega social organization that perpetuates itself by centralized foolproof management controls, supplying religious, moral and social services to the society to emerge stronger than ever. They see the conspicuous hierarchy systematically and effectively controlling every aspect of the church life. Naturally one tends to be impressed by this administrative structure. But one tends to ask - should this be the only way the church has to go ahead, given the radically changing mindset that dismantling of pyramidal and patriarchal authoritarian mechanism even in the traditional family.

It is agreed, the egg shell is required for protecting the delicate rudimentary life deep inside the egg, and for favoring the emergence of this as a fully grown bird in due time. But egg shell is not the same as the life at the core of the egg. As everything in the church has to be at the service of favoring the Gospel life ensconced within the structures, the structure has to be seen not as an end in itself but as a necessary element to favor the dynamics accordingly.

In this small space for reflection I would like to highlight the perspective the present Pope opens for our enlightened consideration. He would like to require of us a shift in our perspective about the church from being a mighty and formidable institution, to experience it as an evangelical family, like the apostolic community, of one heart and one mind

together walking to the destination with the same pace and ensuring much more bonding than even instinctual natural family. The church as the mystical as well as the living salvific/healing presence of Jesus, in time and space, undergoes necessarily the same process of perennial dying to itself and rising to new life.

Now, what does it mean when we say the church is moving away from the self-definition as a corporate body and moving over to understand itself better as a family?

Corporate societies are the product of common will of a collective, to arrive at a common goal, putting together common resources, within the terms agreed to in common. A family where we are born and are grown in, is miles distant and different from a mere cluster of peoples who are agreed to for a common good.

In a corporate house everything is anticipated in the board room and there it ends. It is there all information accumulates from four winds and there these bits of information are processed as regards quality of the product, a marketable commodity or service, customer satisfaction, committed advertising and publicity to increase demand by all means, aggressive marketing, enhancement of productivity as market demand increases, new investment or diversification and finally the profit quotient. It promotes new ideas and working hypothesis, including new investments in men, material and machine for future needs. It is all a vertical

decision making mechanism of few experts, and is answerable only to itself or if at all to remote body of shareholders or stake holders. Nothing is amiss as long as there are growing net profits for the company and hefty dividends year after year and there are no outstanding debts or liabilities.

The church too with the inherited clericalism has a tendency to usurp to itself the total decision making process and live on in the idealized past usurping all knowledge and monopolizing the truth, and go on in spite of feeling total irrelevancy due to finding itself alienated and foreign to the minds of the majority church goers, especially the margined poor and even the erudite. This majority is fast dwindling as the spiritual and moral benefit they used to derive from church affiliation has become merely a sociocultural entertainment. Religion should be the sacramental experience of God's mystery. But when we actively mystify it we are in the realm of commercialization of religion by promoting superstition and blackmail (Jn. 2,16; 4,24, Is 1,10-25).

What then is the church?

Jesus was unique and different in his understanding of religion. He started his prophetic ministry in the synagogue of Nazareth upholding the moral above the cultic and ceremonial (Lk.4, 16-23. Acts 2,43-47; 4,23-30). He focused on its moral and spiritual purpose and regarded its social existence as subservient and sequel to the other. If not as in Jer. 4,7, Dan 3,24, Ps. 74, the Holy God of Israel is capable of pulling down Holy temple when commercial temple cult is used to replace Him (Mt.23,2; Cf. 1Kings 6,1-38).

Jesus in Mt. 20,20ff says that the human

institutions are more often than not enslaving, subjugating and exploitative, and hence are not in tune with the mind of God. Cf. Judg. 9. 8 - Parable of trees wanting to elect a ruler. He advises his apostles and disciples that the human institution where an individual or coteries of a few who lord over others and unilaterally decide what they think to be good for the masses, is pyramidal and exploitative, dehumanizing and hence anything but a Christian community. "It shall not be so among you" (Mt.20,26) were the undiluted words of Jesus. The community is obliged to regard them as kind benefactors and convince themselves as their unworthy beneficiaries. In fact the Sheep do not belong to or owned by the shepherds. They are appointed provisionally by the chief shepherd to take good care of HIS sheep and they must act accordingly (Ez. 34, 1-18; Jn. 21, 15f). Samuel had warned the people who wanted a king like other nations with the necessary deterioration and moral decadence of the popular governments (1Sam. 8, 1-19).

Administrative culture in tune with the mindset of Jesus, and operative in the weekly assemblies of the believers or those on the way of Jesus, is found applied in the narratives in Acts - in choosing a replacement for Judas (Acts 1,23f), in sending out missionaries to various destinations (Act 13,1f), and resolving the problem of accepting the non-circumcised to be Christians in Acts 15. It is always we and the Holy Spirit. The process is smooth and the whole community accepts the final decision thus arrived. There was space for Paul when he ascertained what he preached was in line

with the apostolic faith (Gal 2,1-10) and even when Paul who tells Peter on his face of his hypocrisy (Gal 2,11-14). Paul gives wonderful hints to maintain the unity of the body, the church, and the leadership to exercise their ministry is only to build the body of Christ for the growth of every one to the full stature of Christ. This is to be done by saying truth in love (Eph. 4, 3-16. 1Cor. 12, and 13. 1 Pet. 5, 1-4).

The church in fact is the living and life giving presence of Jesus Christ in the world today. Jesus understands his community very differently. For him it is the earthly and dim anticipation of the eternal family under the Fatherhood of God. For, it is governed not by the high command or central structure and is not intended to deliver some kind of quality services to the public. But primarily it is to be a communion of mature human and committed disciples of Jesus down the times as persons in perennial relationship without exploitative or subjugating motive. The central purpose is to neither create an equal play field to all to sprout and grow to be well integrated humans without being any threat to each other or to any outsider force, nor be threatened by anyone. Always the synergy that is present in a biological body or a tree is the model of the unity of human family. There, all members reach out to the member in distress and every one respond one for all and all for one (Jn. 15,1-12).

Its point of departure is not to achieve a goal using the available personnel resources. Rather it is upward looking community of the disciples of Jesus who wait to be reborn to inner experience of the triune God and emerge live to a higher level of Christian holiness. It is a mutually

supportive networking of ideas and availability of resources. It is a walk hand in hand and taking proactive steps forward with restraint and prudence to have everyone on board. It is moving towards a foreseen common goal but it is also true that being together and agreeing to walk together as members of a family with respect and joy is itself progress and happiness.

Having thus been weaned away to freedom from natural enslavements and be capable of total surrender to the Divine in Abrahamic or Marian Faith, we together emerge to be the channel of peace and of greater love. We sing the one hymn, we have one voice, we have one faith, and we have one Lord; not threatened by imposed uniformity in the guise of safeguarding someone's vested interest or details of traditional rubrics.

The church exists to offer this state of holiness, initiated into here below, as truly satisfying for the inner longings and deeper thirsts of life of modern humans. As in a family, there is no ruler and the ruled in the church. The one Lord and one ruler and he is in heaven (Tim.2) and You are all brethren (Mt. 23,3) wash each other's feet (Jn.13,13).

Jesus affirms before the frontier less might and power of the Roman Empire, then represented by the Roman Governor Pilot that no one has authority over fellow human beings. It is only in the name of God and for God alone - only deeds of life, to promote it and not to destroy. It is for doing good to them that is, to build the life of others, to build the body of Christ. It is holistic, fraternal, consultative, inclusive, relational mechanism which takes all the stake holder on board and

arrives progressively almost by the dialectics of choosing the higher good to arrive to discern God who speaks to the church. Thus arrived at a decision the church sticks on by the decision. It would mean that pyramidal self-serving ominous or super boding power structure, is set aside as redundant, anti-gospel and cruel, and instead, a simpler model is put in place.

Church exists for man and not man for the church (Mt.12). Church as a family wholly owned and cared for by the Lord is living and safeguarding the faith legacy and handing it down faithfully and without subtraction of addition, to the next generation (1 Cor. 11, 23. Lk. 1,1-4; Hb.1,1-2). So every parishioner is important and has to be taken on board both for collective sharing of personal evaluation of life of the community *vis-a-vis* the faith in Jesus as handed down. This sharing should be moving everyone in the church to listening to what the Spirit tells us in written heritage of the Gospels and authentic documents of apostolic faith. This stage is followed by churning of the material in the cauldron of community life leading to personal reflection and interpersonal dialoguing, so as to arrive at the summit of clear visibility in order to make a choice of common direction and common point so that we walk along together hand in hand as members of one family.

Fundamentally, synodality is about journeying together. This happens through listening to one another in order to hear what God is saying to all of us. It is realizing that the Holy Spirit can speak through anyone to help us walk forward together on our journey as the People of God.

Pope Francis maintains - The point is not that we take two years to understand some new buzzword that will soon fade. Synodality is no passing phase! Rather, "walking together" is at the heart of what the Church is all about, as the People of God on pilgrimage in the midst of the world. In the days of the early Church, Saint John Chrysostom said that for him "Church" and "synod" were synonyms, since the Church is all about walking together. In this sense, synodality is a way of renewing the Church from her deepest roots, in order to be more united with one another and better carry out our mission in the world. Concretely, being "synodal" is a way of being and a way of working that takes a more grassroot, collaborative approach, taking time to discern the path forward together. It highlights the fact that we all have something precious to contribute to the Body of Christ. In this way, a "synodal Church" is a Church that listens: "It is a mutual listening in which everyone has something to learn. The lay faithful, the Bishops, the Pope: all listening to each other, and all listening to the Holy Spirit, the "Spirit of truth" (Jn. 14:17), in order to know what He is saying to the Church" (Pope Francis, Commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the institution of the Synod of Bishops, October 17, 2015).

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INCLUSION AND LISTENING: TWO ESSENTIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR A SYNODAL CHURCH

1. Introduction: A Pondering Poem of the Pandemic I came across a poem in the net recently. The poem was titled, "All People". Though it looked like a prose, it was a poem, pondering the pandemic.

All People
All people wonder what one
plus one equals now that numbers
aren't allowed to gather together.
The letters from A to Z are working
from home. The alphabet is closed.
The morning news announces more
sick, more dead. You are your hand.
I am mine, and it's hard not to join
in applause or prayer, it's hard
for us to live alone in our pockets.
At night the light grows quieter,
saving its strength for another day.
Empty street, where are you going,
why? We are in this together. Stay.

Kingston's Poet Laureate, Jason Heroux, had written this poem in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. He was inspired by the etymology of pandemic in Greek (pan = all, demos=people). He himself interpreted the poem in his own style. "The original inspiration behind this poem began when I learned the root meaning of the word 'pandemic.' According to Vocabulary.com: "The word comes from ancient Greek pan (meaning "all") and demos (meaning "people")." On a general everyday level, the pandemic has separated us through quarantine and self-isolation, but on a deeper level it's also strengthened our connections. It has made us realize how much we have in common, and how essential our individual actions are to each other. All People." After providing his reasons for the title of the poem, he reflected on the content of the poem. "I felt it was important for the poem to have more questions than answers, more uncertainty than sureness, because no one really knows what's going on these days. The final word of the poem is "stay." And it's a word with many meanings: to spend time in a place, or situation, of course, and to come to a stop, or standstill. But it also

means to support or prop up, and the power of endurance. All of those definitions apply to us now."

Pandemic was a clarion call to come together and support each other. Pope Francis addressed an empty square at St. Peterson on 27th March 2020, when the pandemic has just begun: "We are all in the same boat. One person's problem is everyone's problem." All people were invited to faith, hope and love during the pandemic days. A similar call was initiated from Pope Francis when he called the synod in 2021 that is extended up to 2024. It was a call to include all, exclude none, listening to each other and thus be transformed.

2. A Demand for an Inclusive and Listening Church before Synodal Call

Antony De Mello in his book, Awareness, mentions about three feats humankind find difficult to achieve: to include the excluded, to return love for hate, and to admit a mistake. We human beings don't include whom we have excluded. The adage, "the birds of the same feather flock together," is not only meant for animal

world but humanity. We invite those people who invite us back. We include our friends, ecclesiastical officials, our relatives to the close circles of relationship and keep gardener, cooks, drivers, watchmen, beggars, poor, strangers far away. Had not Jesus invited us to invite people who will not invite us back (Lk 14: 12-15)? Had not he set us an example by eating with the poor and sinners (Lk. 19: 1-10)? "This synod is about conversion and not winning an argument," so says Pope Francis.

Francis-Effect began with his Apostolic Exhortation, Evangelii Gaudium (2013). Probably, that Exhortation was the starting point of Synodal Call. One can find Synodal phrases that call for an inclusive and listening Church: Decentralized Church, Evangelizers with the smell of the sheep, Church turned as a museum piece, dirty and wounded church, accompaniment, deskbound theology, and confessional turned into a torture chamber. The synod of bishops must be a means of collegiality and "always become more and more an

adequate channel for the evangelization of the present world more than for self-preservation." This approach to ecclesial synodality was also expressed by Pope Francis in a 2015 speech, when citing *Evangelii Gaudium*: "In a synodal Church, as I have said, 'it is not advisable for the Pope to take the place of local Bishops in the discernment of every issue which arises in their territory. In this sense, I am conscious of the need to promote a sound 'decentralization.'"

He continued to express his Dream Church in an Apostolic Constitution, Episcopalis Communio (2018), to initiate a new way of being church through Synodality. Francis had previously held synods on the family (2014, 2015) and on youth (2018), and the synod on the Pan-Amazon region (2019). One of the main characteristics of synods under Francis is "to listen as much as possible to reality and people." Continuing on these lines, Francis developed his idea of family as the nearest hospital to the field hospital that is the Church. Then, in his Christus Vivit for young people, he calls for a different youth ministry, entitled, Popular Youth Ministry. This popular youth ministry includes young of all faiths, young with faith and not faith, and young who don't come to church!

3. Listening Church: A Church for the Present

While we call synod as walking together

from its etymology, we should not forget that this walk is not just a walk without any transformation. While we walk, we interact, talk and listen. Through this interactive walk let us be educated and transformed. The second point for synodal phase of the diocese was on listening. Listening is the first step, but it requires having an open mind and heart, without prejudices. Some questions given by the Preparatory Documents on listening were the following: To whom does our particular Church "need to listen to"? How are the Laity, especially young people and women, listened to? How do we integrate the contribution of Consecrated Men and Women? What space is there for the voice of minorities, the discarded, and the excluded? Do we identify prejudices and stereotypes that hinder our listening? How do we listen to the social and cultural context in which we live?

Catholics today are perhaps more connected across region and culture than ever before by the internet and new media. Nevertheless, and perhaps because of these connections and access to information, many members of the laity have become acutely aware of their powerlessness to effect change within the Church or to make their needs heard. Around the globe, lay people are taking their frustrations to social media, expressing criticisms of popular leaders and Church officials, with little tangible impact. Can the Church find better ways to incorporate the views of not only the loudest Catholics but also those on the

margins, those who have only a tenuous connection to the institutional Church? Synodality speaks to a way of involving the entire people of God into the Church's life, more than a meeting of bishops ever could.

3.1 The Church set the First Example of Listening.

On 6 February 2021, Francis appointed Xavière Missionary Sister Nathalie Becquart as an undersecretary to the General Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops, making her the first woman to be a voting member of the Synod of Bishops. Cardinal Mario Grech, the Secretary General of Synodal Secretariat, was quoted as saying, "With the appointment of Sr. Nathalie Becquart, and the possibility that she can participate with the right to vote, a door has been open. We will then see what other steps could be taken in the future."

But the best example of synodality by the Church was after the opening of Synod 2021-2023. After setting up the diocesan phase from October 2021 to April 2022, the dioceses from all over the world requested the Synodal Secretariat to extend the duration to a few more months since the time was too short for the dioceses to process the synod. The Church listened. She was willing to change her early decision and restructure and extend the diocesan synodal phase to August 2022. That is synodality. The Church is already listening!

3.2 The Missing Image on Listening The Preparatory Document provides two images from the Scriptures on Synodality: 1) The image of Jesus, crowd and apostles and 2) Image of St. Peter and Cornelius (Acts 10). However, there was no reference to the image of a journey where strangers became friends on the way to Emmaus (Lk. 24). This journey is a beautiful image of synodality, especially listening. The stranger (Jesus) was willing to listen to the downcast disciples. The stranger knew everything what they were discussing. He asked a question purposely: What are you discussing on the way? He asked this question since he wanted them to talk so that he could listen. He listened to everything what they shared about their views of Christ and the

Dominic Ashkar reflecting on this event in his book notes this point: "He did not present himself as a teacher with superior knowledge. He listened to the story of his own passion as lived by the disciples. He let the disciples express their feelings, their lost hope, their confusion at the cognitive dissonance caused by report from the women about the empty tomb confusing their own observations at Calvary." This interactive journey made the strangers friends ("Stay with us..."). He created a need for them (He proceeded as if to continue his journey). He celebrated with them (Communion). He took the initiative to join them (Participation). Finally, he disappeared

from their midst empowering them to be Good News (Mission). This is synodality. This is the Church.

4. Inclusive Church, the Church of the Future

An Inclusive Church is an evolutionary Church, not a conclusive church. The Church is evolving with the signs of the times. Reading the signs of the times, we can perceive images of Inclusion and Exclusion today. Pope Francis called for a Church (an inclusive church that includes all and excludes none). The second theme of Synodality, Participation, is a call on who we include and exclude in life. Pope Francis dreams of this inclusive Church that embraces laity (without clericalism), poor, periphery, the whole humanity as brothers and sisters (Fratelli Tutti) and our common home (Laudato Si'). The discussion on Inclusion begins with our Creator who is an inclusive God, continued through His creatures through their words and deeds. Pope Francis continued this reflection as a way being church today.

Theologically, the preparatory document also leans heavily into the Church's Tradition and history, particularly the teaching of Vatican II. It describes the need to think about how everyone can participate in the Church's life and how all people are invited to bring their unique gifts to bear on the mission of evangelization. The document makes a historical argument when it compares the

first millennium of the Church - which was more synodal - to the second millennium - which "emphasized more strongly the hierarchical function." This juxtaposition of more recent history with the life of the early Church suggests that the structures and processes of the second millennium do not adequately respond to the Church's pastoral needs in the present day. Therefore, we must shift gears and highlight the unique role of the gifts that the Spirit has poured out upon the people of God for the benefit of the Church. This journey, which follows in the wake of the Church's "renewal" proposed by the Second Vatican Council, is both a gift and a task. The task is entrusted to all Christians by virtue of their Baptism. St. John Paul II rightly said: "There is no dignity in the Church higher than the dignity of Baptism."

4.1 Image of Inclusion and Exclusion Today

Babette's Feast (1987) is one of the best 45 films of 20th Century by Vatican. We hear that it is at the top of the list for Pope Francis. It is not hard to speculate why this might be. Two sisters, Martine and Philippa, live in a remote Jutland village during the latter half of the 19th century. Their father had founded a pietistic and puritanical Lutheran sect and had ruled over it with some severity. After his death, the sisters maintained the sect. They had a small number of followers who were initially devoted but, over the years, they began to fall out with one another. The sisters never married, their father being against their choices. Babette Hersant, a

cook from the Parisian Cafe Anglais, comes to live with them, a refugee from the French political turmoil of 1871. She serves the sisters faithfully and they come to depend on her. When she wins the lottery, Babette offers to make the sisters, and their friends in the town, a dinner, a banquet. A discorded community of Christians were accepting each other and experienced fellowship among themselves once again just because of a dinner. That dinner transformed sinners. The movie highlighted the images of exclusion and inclusion of a Christian community.

Today we are surrounded by the images of Exclusion. Ukraine-Russia war that is going one is an example. We don't know how long it would be. How it is going to end. Here war does not determine who is right, but who is left. Indian Dioceses, provinces and congregations are divided in terms of caste, race, and rites. Pandemic brought a mixed image of inclusion and exclusion.

At the same time, the Church continuously projected an image of inclusion especially from Vatican II. Church as people of God and Holiness for all are some of the images from Vatican II. But, Pope Francis brought in image of Inclusion, Church as a family (*Amoris Laetitia*), Humanity as brothers and sisters (*Fratelli Tutti*) and the entire universe as our common home (*Laudato Si'*). The prayer, Our Father, is an image of Inclusion. Or else, we should have recited "My Father in heaven, or Father of some of us in heaven…" They synodal image of 15 distinct silhouettes in distinct colours indicate we are journeying together as an inclusive church.

4.2 From Family Synod to Diocesan Synod

For Pope Francis, families "are not a problem, they are first and foremost an opportunity." Each family is like a book that needs to be read, interpreted, and understood with great care, attention, and respect. Saint John Paul II said: "the family is not an area of pastoral care but it is the horizon and the way of the Church" (*Letter to families*, 1994). Families are the subject of evangelization both *ad intra* (towards their children) and *ad extra* (in the ecclesial community). Faith begins and is initiated in the family. My first liturgy was not in parish but in family. It is a miniature Church (Domestic Church). The Church is family of families. Hence, Synodal process has to begin from the family, the first church, and the basic cell of society and the Church. The right way to begin the synod in the Diocese is with the family. The *Family Synod* begins with family prayer. Most of the diocese in Kerala began their synodal process with the family ending with diocese at large. The *Family Synod* along with their neighbourhood led the way for *SCC Synod* and *Parish Synod*. These synods led way to the diocesan synods. We are then already on the way of being new Church. We are then including all, excluding none!

4.3 Mission to Periphery: Sign of Inclusive Church

Inclusion according to Pope Francis is to be seen from his life and teachings. It was basically a demonstrative inclusiveness where his words matched with his deeds. A few expressions are worth mentioning: His initiative in washing the feet of prisoners, women and people of other faiths, his visit to Emirates where he signed a treaty establishing World Fraternity Day and instituting world day of the poor to celebrate and eat with the poor. His call to reach the peripheries is a transformative call for the evangelisers. Pope Francis has tried to set a new course for the church that involves evangelization first of all. "Evangelizing presupposes a desire in the church to come out of herself," he had told the Cardinals just days before the conclave that elected him. "The church is called to come out of herself and to go to the peripheries, not only geographically, but also the existential peripheries: the mystery of sin, of pain, of injustice, of ignorance and indifference to religion, of intellectual currents and of all misery."

- 5. Elements of an Inclusive and Listening Church
- 1. A Yes Church and not a No Church: We need people who can collaborate, cooperate, network and synergise the church by their consent to say "yes" like our Blessed Mother and be positive in the Church.
- 2. An Open Church: A church that is closed is dark and lifeless. A Church that is open allows the light to enter and life is visible. Unfortunately, most of our houses and churches are closed, gates are locked. Watchmen and CCTV cameras are norms of the time.
- 3. A Dirty Church: A Church that moves out of its comfort zone and enters into the realm of the people who are struggling and suffering will be surely dirty and wounded.
- 4. A Lay Church. Majority are laity and clerics are minority at the service of Laity. "Lay people are, put simply, the vast majority of the people of God. The minority ordained ministers are at their service." Francis recalls the preferred ecclesial image, People of God.
- 5. A Poor Church for Poor: Francis chose his name Francis due to St. Francis who was poor. Pope Francis wants a church for the poor, but much more a church with the poor. When he initiated the world day of the poor, he wanted the Church not giving food to the poor, but the church sharing a meal together with the poor.
- 6. An Interconnected Church: More than a dozen times, his encyclical, Laudato Si' mentions "everything is connected." We have forgotten the role of Fratelli tutti and common home in our lives.

Holy Eucharist and emphasized during the homily on the 3 points of discipleship – follow the Lord without any conditions, follow Him hastily and follow Him unreservedly without

looking for any benefits.

28/06/2022 An Ice-break of very interesting, lively and spontaneous sessions was conducted for the

participants by Fr. Rathan Almeida OCD, the Dean of Studies of the Institute, through

which the group became acquainted with each other.

There was another session animated by Fr. Dominic Vas, during which the participants were divided into groups and duties assigned; individual responsibilities were voluntarily

taken up for the smooth running of the Centre.

A visit to the nearby Infant Jesus Church at Pushpashrama run by the OCD Fathers was a surprise. We were amazed by the magnificent structure symbolizing the Religious Unity through the symbols of various religions but unified in Christ. 10/12/2022

11/12/2022

Being the second Sunday of the Month, all the sisters had their recollection with a nourishing talk delivered by Rev. Fr. Holy Eucharist was concelebrated by all our three Fathers during which Fr. Dominic spoke about Jesus who brought us His divinity and humanity, a man fully alive.

Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, the then Prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, was elected as Pope Benedict XVI on 19 April 2005, succeeding Pope John Paul II. He resigned as Pope on 28 February 2013. Today, we prayed for his eternal repose and for his intercession.

07/01/2023

Most Rev. Bernard Moras, Archbishop Emeritus of the Archdiocese of Bangalore took over as the Apostolic Administrator of Mysore Diocese, while our Bishop K.A. William has gone on leave for a certain period. We wish the new Apostolic Administrator God's blessings and our Bishop William prayerful support.

08/01/2023

The solemn Feast of Infant Jesus was celebrated in Infant Jesus Shrine at Pushpashrama. The Feast had a very special significance to everyone as we participated in the Holy Eucharist celebrated by Apostolic Administrator Bernard Moras and concelebrated by several priests. The solemn procession with the decorated statue of Infant Jesus drew the admiration and adoration of everyone.

09/01/2023

Three of our HFB sisters renewed their vows in the hands of Fr. Dominic in the name of their Superior General.

09 - 13/01/2023

Knowledge on the *Spirituality of World Religions* was truly an eye opener to all of us to realize that there is so much of goodness in every religion. Everyone tries according to their faith to reach God one day. Fr. Dominic, through his in-depth knowledge on these religions was able to impart in a very appealing manner.

15/01/2023

Monthly recollection talk was preached by Fr. Rathan on *Growing in Spirituality* which enabled us to look into ourselves and see if we are growing authentically, shedding our false self. We were given practical implications of growing spiritually and the measure to evaluate if we are truly spiritual. Entering into deeper God-experience, graceful in being and doing, ability to speak the language of love, being positive, kind and benevolent in dealings are some of the genuine ways to be holy and spiritual. Dominic, the main celebrant spoke about the beauty and the richness of our country, highlighting its Preamble, where the country has to go a long way to realize the values highlighted in the Constitution, especially the characters such as democratic, secular, brotherhood, respect and other such values for co-existence. It was followed by the flag hoisting presided over by Rev. Fr. Deep Fernandes OCD, our guest professor. He too stressed the importance of knowing more about our Sacred Book and the Constitution, so as to live our life in peace and fraternity. 29/01/2023

Dhyanavana Community along with Mysore CRI conducted a Synodal Seminar on "New Horizons for Ministries in the 21st Century" at Pushpashrama auditorium. The seminar was inaugurated by Rev. Fr. John Peter SAC, and many other erudite papers were presented and practical sessions were conducted by those working in various ministries. It was attended by more than 250 Priests and Religious. An excellent foundational talk on Biblical and Theological perspectives of ministries in the Church was presented by Rev. Fr. Rathan Almeida, OCD. The other themes dealt were Ministry among the LGBTQ especially the Transgenders, Ministry for women and children who are victims of prostitution or sexual exploitation, Catechetical ministry through Gospel Magic and Care for the most vulnerable children, girls' trafficking, destitute and migrants. We appreciate the hard work and coordination put in by Fr. Dominic and his team.

30/01/2023

A good meaningful prayer service was conducted to celebrate peace within and to pass it

on to others. We are committed to be messengers of peace wherever we are and wherever we go.

30 - 03/02/2023 A week-long class on Human Resource Development and Communication was a means of building us to achieve self- actualization. Fr. Joy Francis OCD, through his humorous classes kept the participants active and vibrant, and taught us the rudimentary lessons to become self-actualized persons in life.

FEBRUARY - 2023

02/02/2023

19/02/2023

All the sisters attended in the Annual get-together of the formees of the Diocese of Mysore at St. Philomena's stadium. The highlight of the day was the Talk on Psycho-Spiritual realities affecting Formation by the veteran preacher, Rev. Fr. Gregory Pinto, SVD. The solemn Eucharistic celebration presided over by Archbishop Bernard Moras gave a fitting conclusion to the Seminar. There were around 530 participants from all over Mysore. The sisters from Dhyanavana gave their whole-hearted collaboration in preparing the hall for the Eucharist and also volunteered for registration and sale of books.

16/03/2023



THE RHYTHM OF GRACE IN THE SEASONS OF LIFE

Rhythm is a repeated pattern that brings synchronization in every action. There is a rhythm in every existence. To live here on earth and conduct the aspects of our life, it is important to be in rhythm with the grace of God.

Natural rhythm guides all that we do in our existence. Our breath and heartbeat are constant reminder of life's pulsing rhythm that moves within and around us. Our life has a rhythm of its own and the stages of our life from babyhood through childhood, adulthood, parenthood, and aging. We have a life cycle of which birth and death are a part. Our lives are guided by the rising and setting of the sun and moon, the changes in temperature from day to night and season, the tidal ebb and flow by our own internal rhythm, these rhythms guide our life.

In nature we have four seasons – summer, winter, spring, autumn, and the seasons of the Church are Advent, Lent, and Ordinary season. Advent has got four weeks of seasons that is hope, love, joy and peace. Lent is the season of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. What are the seasons of life? The seasons of life are of two types - the first is grace that is love joy, peace, compassion, mercy, generosity, kindness, etc., and the second is seasons of disgrace - sloth, anger, envy, anxiety, failure, etc. All other seasons have got a rhythm of its time and duration, whereas the rhythm of seasons of life do not have

of its fixed rhythm because it doesn't occur on one season. It keeps changing, depending upon the experiences. It does not have time and place, seasons appear any time of the day, how can we bring rhythm to its seasons, Is there a solution? Yes.

Grace is God's bounty... it was free gift of God that formed man from the dust of the ground and breathed in him a living soul and stamped on that soul the image of God. Grace is not a gift that God packages and bestows on us during creation. Grace is God's presence to create, heal, forgive, reconcile, and transform human hearts, communities, and the entire creation. Wherever God is present there is grace. Grace brought creation into existence, graces birthed human beings, bestows on us the divine image, redeems us in Jesus Christ and is ever transforming the whole creation in the realm of God's reign of compassion, justice, generosity, and peace.

Achieving the rhythm of grace in interior life is considered as the secret of success to well executed life and plays a great role in how life is perceived in terms of functionality and in service. Repetition, Radiation, Contrast, Alteration, Transition and Gradation using these principles we can achieve the rhythm of grace in the seasons of life.

REPETITION

Repetition can be the simplest way to attain rhythm. By the fact we are created in the image and likeness of God the seal of grace is in us, the sacrament of Baptism activates this grace to enter into the life of Christ and constantly live this grace. As we grow in age fragile as we are, we tend to fall prey to our weaknesses and move away from the state of grace .The sacrament of reconciliation and communion enable us to renew ourselves in grace and reconnect ourselves with God and one another. By repeating the grace of forgiveness, act of mercy, charity, kindness and generosity in our day today lives we learn to be in rhythm with the grace of God in all the seasons of our life.

RADIATION

By our very vocation we are called to radiate the love of God through our very life of witness. We draw the inspirations from the life of Jesus to be poor, chaste and obedient, we have our daily joys and daily crosses, where we are tested to live this evangelical counsels, the seasons of joys and sorrows, governed by the grace of God through prayer and by repeated acts of grace we learn to radiate the divine love through acts of charity in tune with the rhythm of grace in the seasons of life.

CONTRAST AND ALTERATION

The rhythm of God's grace in the seasons of our life calls for a constant transformation or transition to the state of grace from anger to patience, hatred to love, sloth to enthusiasm, disobedience to obedience etc. This transition helps us to achieve the rhythm of grace in the seasons of life.

GRADATION

We most often associate rhythm with the music which is used to level in all the aspect of a song. In life the rhythm of grace works in the same way levelling the emotions together in integration as an act of glory. As the Bible says the glory of man is the glory of God. We learn to

glorify God in the experience of the world through the vehicle of God's grace in the seasons of our life.

The rhythm of life is a way of life that brings our legitimate needs, our deepest desire, and our unique talents into harmony with each other. And it is different from routine, which is defined as strong, regular, repeated pattern by which we live. Creating a life of rhythm can help us feel more convinced, fulfilled, happy and content religious in our personal, community life and in our ministry by imparting the rhythm of grace in the seasons of life in different dimensions of life. We shall see a gradual growth in us and the growth in others to those whom we minister as a medium of God's grace.

GRAPES AND OUR LIFE

Grapes as we know, is sweet fruit from which wine is prepared. Wine is consumed during different occasions, at different celebration. But the specific use of grapes in the life of a Christian is an important significance as it represents the blood of Christ. Therefore, during the celebration of Holy Eucharist, at the altar the chalice with wine is raised as a symbol of the blood of Jesus, and the vineyard represent the mission field, thus reminding us of the words of our Lord Jesus "I am the vine, you are the branches" (Jn 15:5).

Some common symbolic meanings for grapes include charity and abundance. In the Bible, grapes are used as a symbol for altruism. In the Old Testament, the grapes were clear evidence of the fertility of the land, even as God had promised it would be. Indeed, the Lord, who is faithful, can be counted on to keep his promises. Hence, the imagery associated with grapes came to be symbolically associated with the joyous fellowship of Israel's covenant relationship with the Lord.

Grapes don't have to strive to become full and sweet. They just stay closely attached to the vine, from which they derive their nourishment. This is the lesson we most vividly see in the natural growth of the vine and branches. This lesson from nature nourishes us spiritually and strengthens our connection with God the creator of all nature. Jesus, in John 15: 1-8 clearly says: "I am the vine, you are the branches: he who abides in me and I in him, he bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit, and so prove to be my disciples."

The branches must abide in the vine to live and bear fruit. Jesus chose the figure of vine and branches for several reasons. It pictures a close, permanent, vital union between them. It is a symbolic belonging, because branches belong entirely to the vine; if the branches are to live and bear fruit, they must completely depend on the vine for nourishment, support, strength and vitality. Yes, Jesus is the fount of spiritual life, strength and growth in the Christian life. Eternal life, spiritual growth, and fruitfulness come through Jesus. Life-giving nourishment flows from the vine to the branches, which then bear fruit.

The fruit "grapes" is a symbol of fruitfulness in our religious life... journeying a story of our belongingness to the true vine "Jesus". From the time we are planted, watered, manured, and pruned, all this has meaning for fruit-bearing in our life.

Therefore, let us raise in our hearts a prayer to God that we might always bear much fruit for the glory of God while bearing witness as His disciples in the present world filled with challenges.

COMMUNITY LIFE-LEARNING FROM ANTS



Even before going to school I prayed and before sleeping too I used to pray at least 3 Hail Mary. If I forgot to pray I used to have bad dreams and it disturbed my sleep.

From those days onwards without rosary I couldn't sleep and so I used to keep the

rosary under my pillow. My love and faith towards Mother Mary gradually increased. When I was going to appear for my selection exam I prayed to her and through her intercession I cleared my exams. I was really worried as I had to write my 10th exams and I used to get upset. I started doing some small penance – kneeling down on the terrace and praying alone so that my friends could not notice me. I was happy to blessed me to pass my 10th class and I do believe that it was because of Mother Mary's powerful intersession.

Before I joined the convent a strange incident took place. It was very painful as I had to abandon my parents and siblings. I had to take that challenge but those days too, Mother Mary who stood by me and encouraged me to stand by my own decision and I really experienced that she is my real mother .Can a woman forget her nursing child...? Even if she forgets, yet I'll not forget you." (Isaiah 49:15). I remember those painful moments but because of her presence and intercession, I overcome those problems. And after having joined the convent there are two incidents that took place in my life. Somebody did some black magic to one of my cousin sisters and sister-in law of my cousin sister. Every day and night she was suffering terribly almost for two months. I used to pray to Mother Mary and during the night vigil on first Thursday adoration, God changed her mind. My cousin and sister-in-law too recovered through the intercession of Mother Mary.

I too faced small struggles, discrimination and challenges during my formation because of my lack of capacity to speak and to read. It was very painful and confusion for me to proceed with my desire and so I used to pray. "My dearest Mother, you know my struggles and challenges. Help me if really God wants me to be a religious sister and accompany me in my journey." After my first profession, during corona, my family had to face financial problems. I cried bitterly and I asked Mother Mary, "Mother, I can't help to solve these problems and so I surrender them to you and to your Son. Please help my family send good people to help us." God indeed sent some people to help us. Now I realize those painful challenges, discrimination etc. were to make me be courageous and to deepen my little faith in God. When I recall my past life, I thank my parents who taught me this great devotion to Mother Mary.

Dear friends, when we face such discrimination, misunderstanding, criticisms and challenges, always remember Mother Mary and ask her intercession. Surely she will help. She is not only the mother of Jesus and the Mother of the Church, but she also is the Mother of every Christian family and the Mother of every person.
